Hananoiwaya Shrine

Described in the Nihon-shoki (one of the oldest books of Japanese history), Hananoiwaya Shrine is believed to be one of the oldest shrines in Japan, drawing many worshippers from all over the country.

The "Otsunakake Shinji" (rope changing ritual) is performed twice a year to maintain the spiritual connection between the shrine and the people of Kumano, and is a designated intangible cultural asset of Mie Prefecture,

Kumano Kodo Iseji Matsumoto-toge Pass

A road used by pilgrims to travel from Ise Jingu to Kumano Big jizo statues can be found in the pass, waiting to greet those who travel through, and the moss-covered paving stones create a beautiful atmosphere. The Iseji pilgrimage route is a World Heritage site, registered as part of the Sacred Sites and Pilgrimage Routes in the Kii Mountain Range. If you want to know more about this charming region, you can ask a Kataribe, or professional storyteller, who specializes in Kumano Kodo lore,

Matsumoto-toge Pass trailhead is a 10-minute walk from JR Odomari station



Onigajyo is a World Heritage Site, National Natural Monument, and designated place of scenic beauty. This rocky wall is roughly 1.2 km long, and contains a system of countless caves both large and small. This area is filled with large rocks that have been carved by wind and marine erosion to the point that these formations are unlike any others. 7519-4323 Kinomoto, Kumano



Opened in 1948, this well-established shop is very popular for its local Kumano cuisine. Its specialty is sanma (mackerel pike) zushi, a type of sushi that is traditionally seasoned with local citrus fruits, and has been eaten in Kumano since the olden days.
